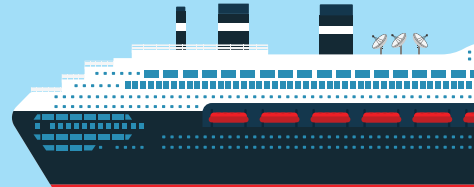

Small Ships

Limited access to narrow channels and remote locations sites

GUIDES

More guides per passenger means you can access the shore quickly and have the opportunity to do more activities.

Small Ships
Have specialist guides and higher staff to passenger ratios (average 1:25)
