POLAR PIONEER

The Polar Pioneer was built in 1982 in Finland as an ice-strengthened research ship, and for many years she plied the treacherous waters of the Russia's northern coast. In 2000 she was refurbished in St Petersburg and converted to a passenger ship. The ship is ideally suited to cruising in Polar regions due to her size, strength and manoeuvrability, enabling her to sail closer in to landing sites than other vessels. The ship features a lounge with bar, small but well stocked library, two dining rooms, lecture and presentation room, sauna, medical clinic and spacious viewing platforms and observation decks. The ship carries a small fleet of inflatable Zodiacs with outboard motors used for shore landings. Although the Polar Pioneer is not a luxury vessel, it is our most popular ship for travel to Antarctica. The accommodation is simple yet comfortable and the meals wholesome and uncomplicated.
