ANTARCTIC PENINSULA

The Antarctic Peninsula is the largest and most prominent peninsula on the continent, extending 1,300 km between Cape Adams (Weddell Sea) and a mainland point south of Eklund Islands.

Because it is so close to mainland South America, the Antarctic Peninsula remains very popular with tourists, who are drawn by its stunning scenery and wildlife.

Every day on the Antarctic Peninsula brings varied landscapes—sculptural glaciers, sparkling sea ice, and dramatic mountains. Gentoo and chinstrap penguins abound, whales are frequently seen, and fur, leopard, and Weddell seals are often sunning themselves on the ice. Guests may also visit historic huts or research stations, a powerful reminder of Antarctica's unique history.

ANTARCTIC CIRCLE

Only a handful of ships make the long journey beyond the circle into a latitude of 66° 33' south. For travellers who choose an Antarctica Circle expedition, the knowledge of finally joining a very elite community of people who've ever sailed this far south brings an overwhelming feeling of accomplishment.

EAST ANTARCTICA

An expedition to East Antarctica and the Ross Sea follows in the footsteps of famed explorers like Robert Falcon Scott and Sir Ernest Shackleton. This region of Antarctica is far less visited than the Antarctic Peninsula and offers a more remote wilderness than many can imagine - some of the largest seabird colonies, historic huts dating back to the Heroic Age, and isolated glacial landscapes await.

WHY GO:

- ✔ Whales, seals, and the epic Commonwealth Bay and Ross Sea Shelf mean that each day will bring completely unique scenery and adventures.
- ✔ Many East Antarctica cruises also visit Australia and New Zealand's Sub-Antarctic Islands, known for their endemic species, biodiversity, and unique landscapes.



FALKLAND ISLANDS



FALKLAND ISLANDS

Set 700 km north of Antarctica, the Falklands are sparsely inhabited, dramatic and immensely fascinating. Home to five distinct species of penguins, a large colony of Albatross, an abundance of elephant seals, Sea lions and plenty of migrating whales and dolphins, these South Atlantic islands are a sub-Antarctic haven.

HISTORY OF THE FALKLANDS

There have been French, British, Spanish and Argentine settlements during its history, and while Britain re-established its rule in 1833, the islands continue to be claimed by Argentina, which refers to them as Islas Malvinas. Argentina invaded the islands in 1982, resulting in the two-month-long undeclared Falklands War between both countries. It resulted in the surrender of all Argentine forces and the return of the islands to British administration.

SOUTH GEORGIA



SOUTH GEORGIA

South Georgia is truly the penguin, seal and seabird headquarters of the far south, an island that figuratively bursts at the seams with Antarctic wildlife.

WILDLIFE

Over three-quarters of the fur seals living in Antarctica are found here, as well as several of the world's largest rookeries of king penguins, South Georgia is the southern wildlife crèche everyone needs to experience.

Salisbury Plain and St Andrew's Bay are the two most popular landing sites for king penguin spotting whilst over on the other side of the island, you can see huge numbers of chinstrap, gentoos and glorious macaroni penguins.

GRYTVIKEN

South Georgia's largest settlement is a former whaling station and also the last resting place of Sir Ernest Shackleton. Visiting his grave is an absolute bucket-list dream for so many visitors.

WEDDELL SEA

The Weddell Sea is known for its massive tabular icebergs.

The sea is fringed by numerous ice shelves, including the Filchner-Ronne Ice Shelf. The Weddell Sea is notable for its designation by scientists as having the clearest water of any sea and is home to huge colonies of Adelie penguins, plus crabeater seals, minke whales, and orcas.

The region is also renowned for its Weddell seals. These remarkable animals are able to remain submerged for more than an hour and rasp through the ice using their teeth to maintain breathing holes. A visit to the Weddell Sea is a true privilege few have ever experienced and those who make the effort are rewarded with vast, unique ice formations, beautiful isolation, and ample wildlife.

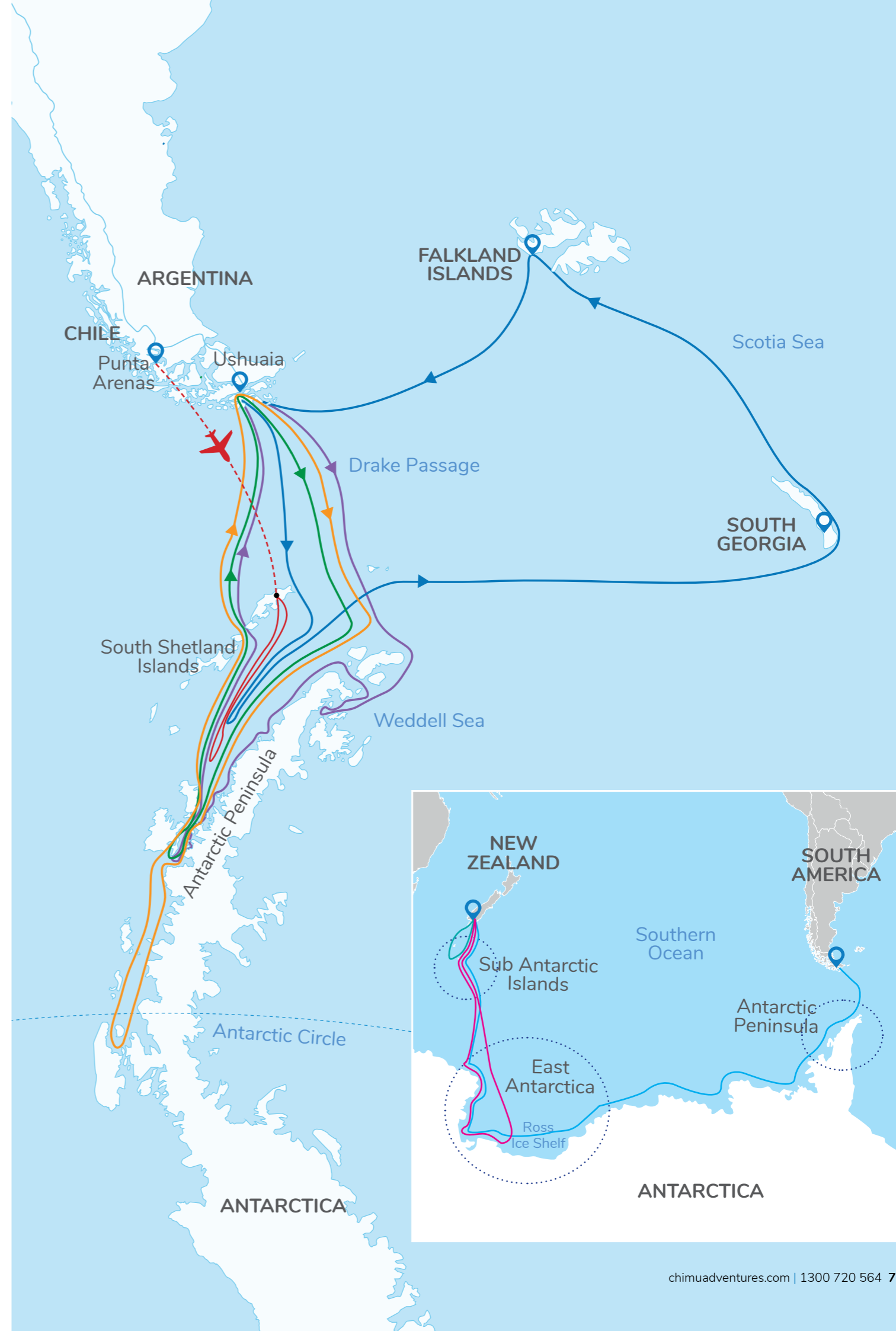

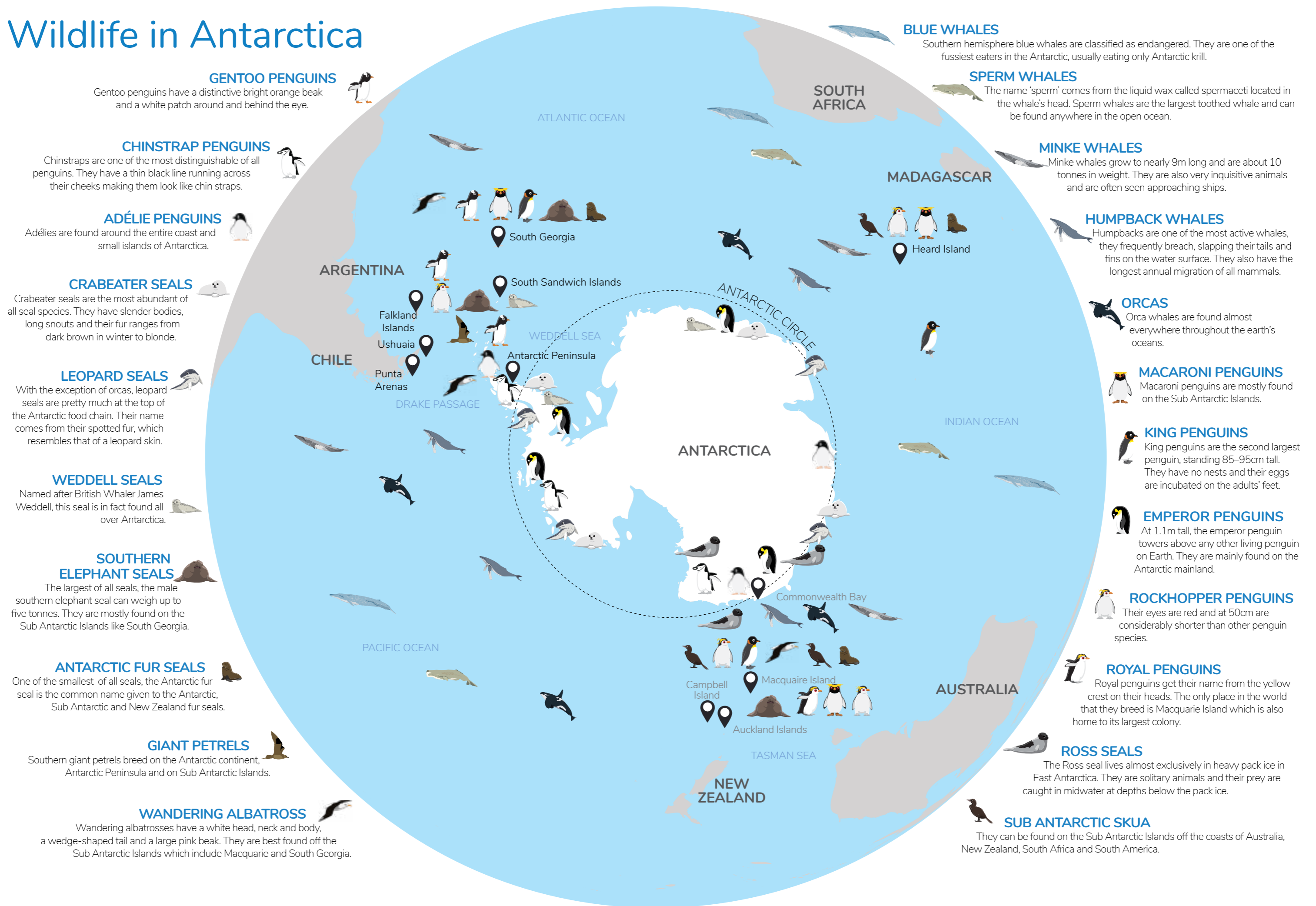

Wildlife in Antarctica



GENTOO PENGUINS

Gentoo penguins have a distinctive bright orange beak and a white patch around and behind the eye.

CHINSTRAP PENGUINS

Chinstraps are one of the most distinguishable of all penguins. They have a thin black line running across their cheeks making them look like chin straps.

ADÉLIE PENGUINS

Adélies are found around the entire coast and small islands of Antarctica.

CRABEATER SEALS

Crabeater seals are the most abundant of all seal species. They have slender bodies, long snouts and their fur ranges from dark brown in winter to blonde.

LEOPARD SEALS

With the exception of orcas, leopard seals are pretty much at the top of the Antarctic food chain. Their name comes from their spotted fur, which resembles that of a leopard skin.

WEDDELL SEALS

Named after British Whaler James Weddell, this seal is in fact found all over Antarctica.

SOUTHERN ELEPHANT SEALS

The largest of all seals, the male southern elephant seal can weigh up to five tonnes. They are mostly found on the Sub Antarctic Islands like South Georgia.

ANTARCTIC FUR SEALS

One of the smallest of all seals, the Antarctic fur seal is the common name given to the Antarctic, Sub Antarctic and New Zealand fur seals.

GIANT PETRELS

Southern giant petrels breed on the Antarctic continent, Antarctic Peninsula and on Sub Antarctic Islands.

WANDERING ALBATROSS

Wandering albatrosses have a white head, neck and body, a wedge-shaped tail and a large pink beak. They are best found off the Sub Antarctic Islands which include Macquarie and South Georgia.

BLUE WHALES

Southern hemisphere blue whales are classified as endangered. They are one of the fuzziest eaters in the Antarctic, usually eating only Antarctic krill.

SPERM WHALES

The name 'sperm' comes from the liquid wax called spermaceti located in the whale's head. Sperm whales are the largest toothed whale and can be found anywhere in the open ocean.

MINKE WHALES

Minke whales grow to nearly 9m long and are about 10 tonnes in weight. They are also very inquisitive animals and are often seen approaching ships.

HUMPBACK WHALES

Humpbacks are one of the most active whales, they frequently breach, slapping their tails and fins on the water surface. They also have the longest annual migration of all mammals.

ORCAS

Orca whales are found almost everywhere throughout the earth's oceans.

MACARONI PENGUINS

Macaroni penguins are mostly found on the Sub Antarctic Islands.

KING PENGUINS

King penguins are the second largest penguin, standing 85–95cm tall. They have no nests and their eggs are incubated on the adults' feet.

EMPEROR PENGUINS

At 1.1m tall, the emperor penguin towers above any other living penguin on Earth. They are mainly found on the Antarctic mainland.

ROCKHOPPER PENGUINS

Their eyes are red and at 50cm are considerably shorter than other penguin species.

ROYAL PENGUINS

Royal penguins get their name from the yellow crest on their heads. The only place in the world that they breed is Macquarie Island which is also home to its largest colony.

ROSS SEALS

The Ross seal lives almost exclusively in heavy pack ice in East Antarctica. They are solitary animals and their prey are caught in midwater at depths below the pack ice.

SUB ANTARCTIC SKUA

They can be found on the Sub Antarctic Islands off the coasts of Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and South America.

Small Ship Expeditions

Antarctica is the ultimate journey, the most comprehensive, unforgettable and breathtaking trip you could ever take to the end of the world. As well as being the most mesmerising travel destination on the planet, it is also one of the most interactive.

WHAT IS EXPEDITION CRUISING?

Expedition cruising is a more in depth and interactive way to explore everything Antarctica has to offer. Expedition ships are smaller in size with Zodiacs on board to facilitate easy access to explore the wilderness led by a highly trained expedition team.

Expedition guests are usually more interested in exploring a place rather than going on a traditional cruise where the focus is mainly on the onboard experience.

Every expedition is different, which is what makes the experience so unique and exciting!

EXPERT GUIDES

An Antarctic expedition is nothing without passionate and experienced guides. They play such an important part in delivering the experience and are not just experts in fields like marine biology, geology, and environmental science but are also just as excited and passionate about Antarctica as you are!

Your expedition guides will interpret the wildlife you see, operate Zodiacs, assist you on excursions, and interpret the wildlife you see on excursions. They'll also lead presentations and workshops onboard to help you learn more about the Antarctic environment.

SHIP SIZE & PASSENGER NUMBERS

When it comes to booking an Antarctic expedition, passenger numbers make a huge difference! This is due to strict governing rules on Antarctic ships by the International Association of Antarctic Tour Operators, or IAATO, put in place to protect the pristine Antarctic environment.

WHY UNDER 200 PASSENGERS IS BEST

Ships with 200 and under passengers allow for the most opportunities to get off the ship and explore. Only 100 passengers per ship can be on shore at once, so you alternate between zodiac cruising and passengers on land allowing two excursions per day.

On ships with 200-500 passengers, the crew will need to alternate passenger groups and you may only have the chance to go on land once per day or once every other day. With time limits strictly in place for shore excursions, this means you're limited in your ability to explore.

Large ships with over 500 passengers are not permitted to make landings on Antarctica and have limited access due to their size.

How To Choose The Right Ship

Your choice of expedition vessel will play an essential role in your overall Antarctic experience. As genuine Antarctica specialists, we have the knowledge and experience to help you get this decision just right.



DURATION

You may not yet know where you want to go in Antarctica and how much you can budget for your trip but you probably will know how much time you have to travel.



DESTINATION

If you have a particular destination, like South Georgia, in mind, check that the ship visits that location.



SHIP SIZE

Ship size does matter!

Remember, 500+ passenger ships are not allowed to make landings in Antarctica, and have restricted access to certain areas.

Imagine going all that way and not being able to get off the ship and get amongst the penguins!



EXPEDITION STYLE

Excursions and landings vary by operator. The frequency of landings, duration, and guide ratio all shape your Antarctic experience. It's worth getting right, and our specialists can help.



COST

It really depends on the duration of your cruise, size of the ship and the comfort levels you desire.

Many ships offer early bird discounts, so it pays to plan ahead.



ACTIVITIES

Ships offer a variety of optional adventure activities like kayaking, camping, snowshoeing and paddleboarding.

These vary by ship and departure, so make sure you pick a ship that offers the activities you want to take part in, and if they are available when you want to take your trip.

Remember to book activities early as popular ones, like kayaking, can sell out!

A Typical Day In Antarctica*

There's truly no such thing as a typical day in Antarctica. Individual excursion locations are different and are decided by ever-changing conditions like weather, ice formations, ocean currents, and light conditions. Seasonal timing plays a significant role too, influencing not only the landscape but also the behavior and presence of wildlife.



5:00am Enjoy an early coffee or wander to the open decks to set eyes on the morning's new location for the first time.

7:00am -8:00am Breakfast is served. Once you've had your breakfast you return to your cabin and get ready for your first excursion.



8:00am - 11:30am Once instructed, you walk down to the mud room where you get dressed in your expedition gear, put on your boots and then jump on a Zodiac to spot some penguins and explore the white continent.



11:30am - 1:30pm After a cup of tea to warm up, lunch is called and the expedition crew prepare a BBQ lunch on the back deck. The ship begins to move along slowly to your next excursion site.



1:30pm - 3:30pm After lunch you may arrive at a research base. Your host shows you through the base's living areas and you get a feel for the life of a scientist at this base. You cruise around on the zodiacs spotting wildlife, then head back to the ship once more.



3:30pm - 7:00pm Back on board the ship, you can choose to read or sit on the deck with a drink and some snacks as the ship moves again. The expedition team present a recap on the day and inform the passengers about what is planned for the following day.



7:00pm - 8:30pm Dinner is called. While waiting for your meal, trade images on your camera with your fellow passengers and talk about everything that you've seen during the day. Afterwards head to the lounge bar for some drinks or watch a movie in your cabin and relax after an amazing day.

FERNANDINA ISLAND

Fernandina is the main westernmost island in the Galápagos Islands, the third largest and youngest of the islands, less than one million years old. It is the most volcanically active and sits at the center of the hot spot that created the Galápagos Islands.

Wildlife found here includes Galápagos hawks and penguins, pelicans, marine iguanas, sea lions, fur seals and the flightless cormorant - the only flightless cormorant in the world.

WHY GO

- ✔ It is the most pristine island with the most active volcanoes in the of the Galápagos.
- ✔ Home to a large population of marine iguanas.



ISABELA ISLAND

The largest and one of the younger islands, Isabela Island was formed by the joining of six shield volcanoes, all apart from one are still active!

The west coast of Isabela is known as the best place to see whales in the Galápagos. Some 16 species of whales have been identified in the area including humpbacks, sperms, sei, minkes and orcas.

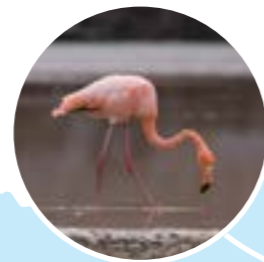


SANTIAGO ISLAND

Also known as Isla San Salvador or James Island, this is one of the more popular Galápagos Islands to visit, with a number of excellent tourist sites. Centrally located between Santa Cruz and Isabela Islands, this island is the fourth largest in the archipelago at 585 square kilometres. It was the second island to be visited by Charles Darwin aboard the Beagle.

- ✔ Puerto Egas on James Bay to see lava pools as well as caves and inlets that are home to an amazing variety of wildlife.
- ✔ Sugar Loaf Volcano, with some spectacular views of the surrounding landscape.



FLOREANA ISLAND

Floreana Island is the site of the first "post office", established in 1793 by whalers. It was the first island to be colonised by Ecuadorians in 1832 as a penal colony that didn't last long because of the lack of fresh water.

- ✔ See two contrasting beaches, one that consists of olive-green sand and the other known as Flour Beach, made up of fine, pulverised coral.
- ✔ 'Devil's Crown', a volcanic crater is the premier snorkelling spot in the Galápagos.

Española is the southernmost of the Galápagos Islands and is also one of the oldest. Geologists estimate it is about four million years old.

Because Española is one of the most isolated islands, it has a large number of endemic species — the Española mockingbird, the Española lava lizard, and the waved albatross.

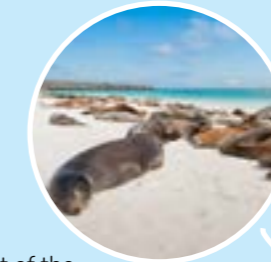
